












I really enjoyed Kontiki because of the activities and the creativity that went into making our raft, gear, and costumes. Everything really showed the Scout spirit involved.

The next morning we were all up early to have a full breakfast of bacon and eggs and pork sausages to get the tummies full before a 3 hour paddling trip was to take place.



INTERVIEW WITH RON TUFFIN ALIAS "BAGHEERA" — NEW 1ST PINELANDS ASSISTANT PACK SCOUTER

Q: Welcome to the 1st Pinelands Cub Leader Team. Tell us about yourself.

A: I was born in Johannesburg in the mid-seventies.

Q: Favourite music and movies?

A: I have a varied taste in music which, much to my wife's despair, does not include anything 'classical'. My current playlist is dominated by Eighties Pop (Depeche Mode, Duran Duran...) but also includes some angry teenage girl music (Pink, Avril Lavigne), Country and Western (Lady Antebellum, Taylor Swift (I have daughters, and I'm sticking with that excuse), all the way through to some screamers by the likes of 30 Seconds to Mars and Linkin Park. Although If I had to pick

a favourite it would be

that place occupied by the likes of Bon Jovi and Bryan Adams. My choice in movies is probably as varied as my choice in music. The greatest movies of all time for me include Gladiator, Schindler's list, and Inception. I love super hero movies; and am a nut for science fiction.

Q: Can you share with us some of your experiences in cubbing and scouting

A: I have been involved in the scout movement since 1983 when I joined 1st Greenside in Johannesburg as an 8 year old cub. In those days cubs was just for 3 years and I went up to Scouts in '86 around my 11th birthday. I later joined 1st Pinelands when my family moved to Cape Town in 1990.

In the early 90's a group of Western Cape scouters were preparing to start a PLTU in the Western Cape. As part of this preparation a number of scouters and scouts were sent to Lexden in Natal to attend a PLTU course at the home of PLTU. Along with 5 other 1st Pinelanders, I was privileged to be one of the scouts attending PLTU as a 'pant at Lexden in July of '91.

In December of '91 I travelled to Port Elizabeth to QM on 7th Glands PLTU. And was ultimately a QM on 1st Gilqua PLTU in 1992. All of these PLTU experiences grew me in some way.

Among the many Scouting experiences I treasure a few stand out.

- Cuboree in '83 at the Rand Show Grounds.
- · My Leaping Wolf.
- JOTA in 88 or 89 in Mafikeng the birth place of Scouting (CQ, CQ, CQ Jamboree, this is Hotel 5 Alpha Bravo Papa. CQ, CQ Jamboree).
- Googlie Adventure (I forget the year) the biggest wide game you have ever encountered
- SANJAM '89 at Midmar dam in Natal.

- Cederberg adventures as a scout and later a staff member on the diving base.
- Along with Bruce Dixie, I accompanied Garth Hannaford on his Springbok Hike in the Groot Winterhoek near Tulbagh.
- I was given the great honour to reply to the address of the TL at the end of the 66th Lexden PLTU.
- I'm not sure if the tradition remains at Gilqua PLTU where the Program Staff maintain a "hit list" of their favourite staff members. The inaugural hit list was released just prior to the 1st Gilqua course starting. I placed in all 10 positions. Unfortunately, although I maintained my position at the top, I was down to only 5 positions by the end of the course. To be clear this was not a "hit list" like you hear on the radio, more like something the Mob would maintain. Fun was had by all.

Q: What do you enjoy about being a pack scouter?

A: I never expected to be involved with Cubs. I always thought I'd be more involved at a troop level (I did a year as APS of 1st Rosebank Air Scouts in 1995), but I am loving being involved with these kids.

The thing that gets me most is their enthusiasm to learn. Everyone loves playing games and our cubs are no different, but when it comes time to learning knots, the points of the compass, or how to stop a bleeding nose they are just as into it as if we were about to play a game of Stalk the Lantern. And they are not teenagers yet so they still think we (adults) know some things.


Lyrics for water safety song

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
