Please bring along a hat, pack-lunch, plenty of water, sunscreen and of course, your best and most repetitive hiking songs.

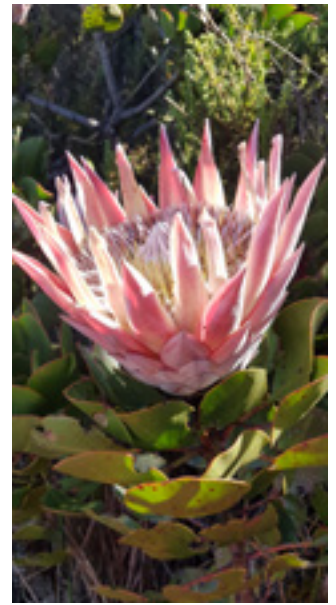
PLEASE NOTE:

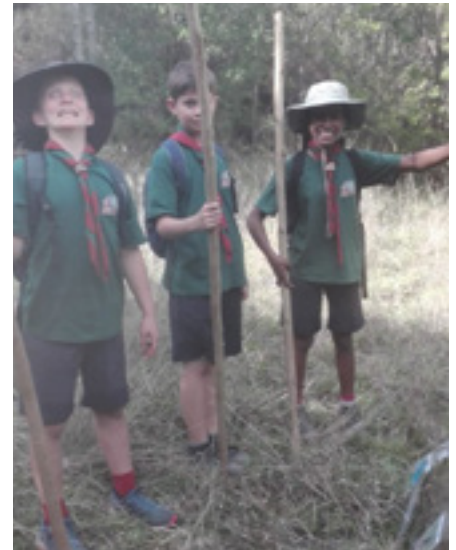

SIMEON'S ADVENTURER HIKE



On Monday 22nd of April 2019, I (Simeon) organised and hiked a route upon Table Mountain. Malini Mistery, Joshua and Daniel Lugt and my father Peter Davies accompanied me. Malini's mother assisted me to transport two of the Scouts where we rendezvoused at Kloof Nek parking lot. We started the hike from the Pipe Track.

We could see the breathtaking scenery of Camps Bay as we looked across to the west. Unfortunately, a recent fire had destroyed the nearby vegetation, however I was glad to see that many plants and trees revealed new growth. I could tell that the fire was put out quickly because the damage would have been worse.

As we followed the Pipe Track, we could see where two water pipes appeared and disappeared in and out of the ground. I pondered about the ingenuity of laying down water pipes so that we may have tap water. Eventually, further along this gentle path, we lost all sight of the two pipes.

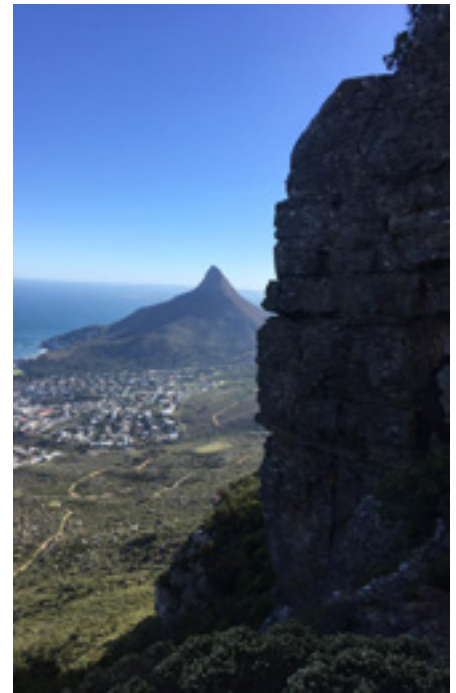
As we continued walking along the unchanging gentle slope, we came across a path with a 'No Entry' sign that leads up to The Table. Immediately thereafter, we found the next path that read 'Diagonal' which I had not chosen in my route. We checked the map when we reached the start of the path that would take us to the top of Kasteelspoort where we found a map marker. It showed where the paths would end up going in each direction. We chose to have a brief discussion at this juncture to decide whether to proceed hiking up the incline towards the Valley of the Red Gods, pass through Echo Valley on up to Maclear's Beacon and then down Platteklip Gorge or hike up towards the Valley of the Red Gods, then turn off towards the Scout Hut, hike past the dams and make our way to Maclear's Beacon and down Platteklip Gorge. The final decision was my original route to hike past the Scout Hut and the dams, up to Maclear's Beacon and down Platteklip Gorge. When we reached Hely-Hutchinson Dam, we turned off onto the immediate path that we found, moved swiftly up

and around to Junction Peak. Once we arrived at the start of the Hoerikwaggo Hiking Trail, we found ourselves at a junction point where we checked the map to make sure that we were going in the right direction towards Maclear's Beacon. We had to check the map again at the next junction further along the path toward Maclear's Beacon. Soon afterwards, we met an American couple that seemed to be lost trying to reach Maclear's Beacon who agreed to follow us as we were going there too.

When we reached Maclear's Beacon, we stopped to eat our packed lunches and to take photos (see below this article). This was the first time that Malini and Daniel had been to Maclear's Beacon. We hiked down from this memorable point, onto the path parallel to the Hoerikwaggo hiking trail and then all the way up to the top of Platteklip Gorge. This was, quote "The worst route in the history of hiking routes" said Joshua. We could understand why many Hikers disliked that route. Personally, I felt somewhat impatient, as Platteklip seemed to go on forever with a dominating zigzag route. I will definitely avoid it next time. Below Platteklip, we found ourselves at a sign-post that also revealed where the different paths would lead. I also checked my map to confirm our continuation.

We followed the Upper Contour Path that had led us towards the Lower Cable Station. When we arrived at the path that went down towards the Lower Cable Station, we continued the gentle slope down towards the Lower Cable Station. After passing the Lower Cable Station, we made our way down Tafelberg road and back to Kloof Nek parking lot, where Joshua and Daniel's mother was waiting for us. Mrs Lugt kindly helped to transport Malini, Joshua and Daniel home. My Dad managed to drive the two of us home with aching muscles. In my opinion besides that horrible Platteklip section, the hike went pretty smoothly. There were no injuries and we all agreed that we had fun!

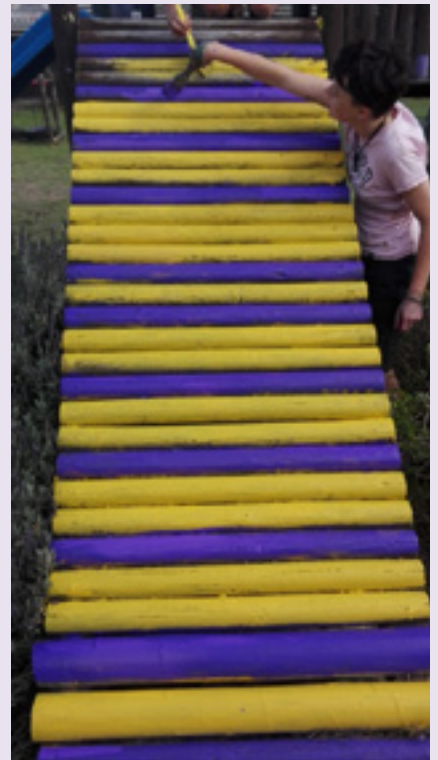

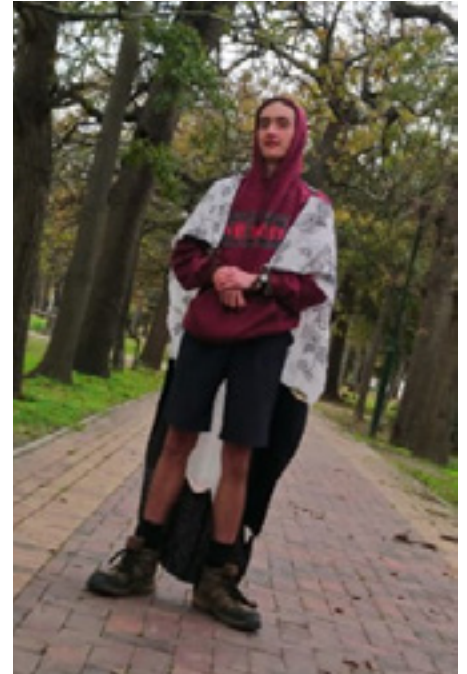


PL'S + 2 WEEKEND

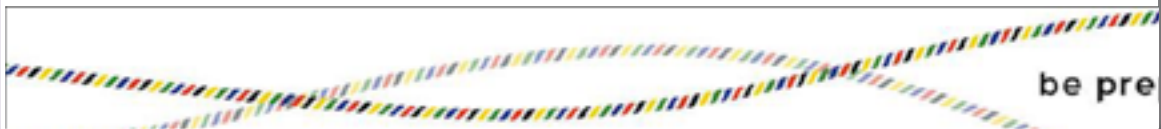
Anja Mühr will be taking over as Troop Scouter from the beginning of the Third Term 2019, ably assisted by Joe Harding and the rest of the Scouter team.

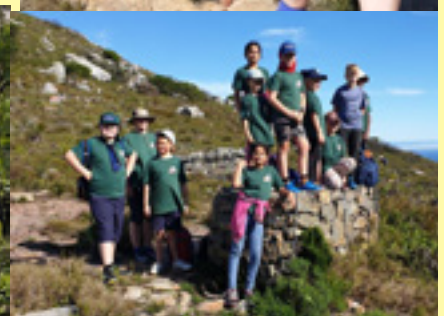
